
Why did we create the Reading Boxes?

Goliath Birdeater Tarantula

The Goliath Birdeater Tarantula is one of the largest spiders in the world. Many people believe that it is the largest spider living today.

Appearance

The Goliath Birdeater Tarantula has a very large body covered with fine hair. Its body can grow to about 7.5 cm in length and its leg-span can measure more than 25 cm across from foot to foot. It has unusually thick legs. If one of its 8 legs is broken off a new one will grow to replace it.

Habitat

The Goliath Birdeater Tarantula is found in the rainforests of north-eastern South America. It spends most of the day in its burrow because it hunts for food at night. This spider needs the high humidity of the rainforest to shed its skin as it grows, otherwise it will die.

Food

The Goliath Birdeater Tarantula eats large insects, frogs, mice and lizards. Even though it is called a birdeater, birds are not generally part of its diet.

Temperament

If provoked the Goliath Birdeater Tarantula can become very aggressive, flicking hairs into the eyes of predators. It will also bite or make angry hissing noises. Besides its fearsome look and temperament, its bite is not dangerous to humans, although it is
